

About & 2020 Year in Review

Mental Health America of Hawai'i (MHAH), an affiliate of the renowned national organization, is a highly regarded 501(c)(3) non-profit organization serving the State of Hawai'i. For nearly 80 years, MHAH has been fulfilling its mission "to promote mental health & wellness through education, advocacy, service, and access to care" through its vision of 'mental wellness for all.' We endeavor to reduce the shame and stigma of mental illness and improve the overall care, treatment, and empowerment of



those with or at risk for mental health challenges and illness across all stages of life in Hawai'i. Through our leadership, we have been expanding mental health awareness, preparedness, understanding, and action through trainings, education, and advocacy since 1942.

In 2020 the bedrock of our organizational structure was made up of layers of connectedness, community, and adaptability. Sometimes the best way to address a challenge is to brave it while you make your way through it - this is the sentiment that guided our overarching philosophy throughout the year. Considering the ongoing pandemic, cries for justice, and the political unrest in 2020, we redirected significant effort into virtual community-based education and training. In addition to providing tips, tools, and strategies on mental health and wellness, our trainings gave consumers an opportunity to connect at a time when physical distancing was required. As the year progressed, we monitored the local and national environments to identify areas in which we could be of benefit which ultimately led to the development of nine new trainings across the year. Some of these include Self-Care for Youth, A Practice in Coping Skills, Tips & Strategies for Surviving and Thriving, and Braving the Negative Impact of COVID-19 on Mental Health. Demand for trainings continued to increase throughout the year. In fact, when compared to the year prior the number of trainings offered in 2020 increased by nearly 300%, serving nearly 8,000 participants.

In addition to our trainings, we worked closely with partners out of our Maui office to produce a Maui County Suicide Prevention PSA viewed nearly a thousand times on YouTube, 1,500 engagements on social media, and multiple plays on Akaku Television, Hawaii Public Radio, and other Maui stations. Our statewide efforts realized a 46% increase in media appearances over 2019, local and national speaking engagements, and a 15% increase in our statewide help calls. We were also fortunate to host multiple creative collaborations like the four-part Healing Arts series with our friends at the Hawaii Arts Alliance in May, and a suicide prevention initiative in partnership with Hawai'i State Representative Della Au Belatti and PhRMA.



One of the positive outcomes of 2020, and a trend that continued through much of the year, is that the discussion on the importance of mental health and wellness moved to the forefront like it has never been before. However, the stigma and shame associated with mental health continues to be a significant barrier to accessing resources. In the coming year we are committed to keeping this conversation going through all our efforts. As Barack Obama said, "Change will not come if we wait for some other person or some other time. We are the ones we've been waiting for. We are the change that we seek."

Education & Engagement

With a global pandemic, quarantine, and political unrest impacting the country and our state, Hawai'i communities are focused on being healthy, safe, and resilient in these challenging times. They are gathering to learn new skills, practice self-care, and improve community engagement and resiliency. The most readily available and safest formats are our virtual trainings and online resources.

Our youth program has been focused on creating a virtual training version to provide education and skills related to bullying prevention and suicide prevention. Our adult program has been focused on certifying our trainers in new, virtual versions of trainings, including Mental Health First Aid - Adult Version and Youth Mental Health First Aid. These trainings teach the warning signs of a mental health crisis and concrete intervention skills to support those in need of mental health help.
